General Meeting Using Photography to Study Tufted Puffins and their Habitat on the Oregon Coast May 16, 2024, 7:30 PM

Carina Kusaka is originally from Hawai'i and received a B.S. in Fish, Wildlife, and Conservation Biology from Colorado State University, where she studied behavioral and movement ecology of reptiles. Her PhD



research at Oregon State University (OSU) is focused on the Tufted Puffin, a Species of Greatest Conservation Need along the Oregon Coast.

Carina will present her master's work- researching tufted puffins on the Oregon Coast. Using a combination of field-collected data and aerial photographs over the past 30 years, she is conducting spatial analyses to examine changes in suitable breeding habitats over time and relating these changes to climate. She hopes this will better inform land managers on which conservation actions will be most effective. In the hopes of prioritizing outreach and education efforts, she is also writing and

illustrating a children's book, using tufted puffins as a flagship species to catalyze excitement about coastal ecology conservation.

Marine Science Center in Newport, where he studies sounds of whales and other marine and terrestrial species.

Adams Elementary Students Will Be Visiting Hesthavn Again

As the weather is getting warmer, ASC Education is seeing an uptick in outreach as well as in-house programs. The first full week of May we will be hosting an Open House at Hesthavn as part of the Sustainability Coalition's Natural Areas Celebration Week. This will be May 6-10 from 12-2 PM. Later in the month, the Adams Elementary 4th graders are coming back to Hesthavn for a field trip. Over 2 days, 60 children will get to sample macroinvertebrates from Oak Creek, use a dichotomous key to identify native plants along the trails, see our specimen collection, and examine owl pellets. Then on June 1, we will be attending Get Outdoors Day at Peavy Arboretum from 9 AM-3 PM. ASC and other organizations will have lots of fun activities for kids. Conservation News

Huge conservation wins in Alaska

The Biden administration just took two steps that each protected huge areas of Alaska from damage: it protected 13 million acres of Alaska's North Slope from oil and gas drilling. Also, it blocked a huge new proposed copper mine and associated road in central Alaska.

The North Slope, the part of Alaska that slopes down toward the Arctic Ocean, is home to the National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska (NPR-A). Just over half of NPR-A is now closed to drilling for oil and gas. This is critical both for the indigenous communities that rely on the area for subsistence living and for the wildlife there - nesting birds, caribou herds, and many other types of flora and fauna - and it also provides a boost for combating climate change.

The other action was to deny permission to build a proposed road through Gates of the Arctic National Park and Preserve for access to build a huge new copper mine. Gates of the Arctic is a vast, pristine, roadless wilderness area in central Alaska. The proposal would build a private industrial road through the heart of it, cutting across countless waterways and damaging subsistence hunting and wildlife habitats alike. In addition, a mine would probably have large impacts on the environment, not only from the mine pit itself but also from tailings from the substantial industrial activity of the mine.

Because these actions were done by Biden's executive actions, not by Congress, they can (and probably will) be reversed if Trump beats Biden in November.

Monitor Needed for the Bluebird Trail

The Bluebird Trail is a special project of the Audubon Society of Corvallis that was started in 1976. Its mission is to promote the conservation of Western

Bluebirds (*Sialia mexicana*) by setting up nest boxes and monitoring them regularly during the breeding season, which runs from April through August. We currently have nearly 400 nest boxes at dozens of sites on public and private property in Benton and Linn counties. You can learn more about the Bluebird Trail here:

Visit Hesthavn During Natural Areas Celebration Week

Multi-Day Field Trips

May is for the birds!

First off, our Rogue Valley field trip is May 4-6. Our objective is to find birds of the California chaparral - Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, California Towhee, and Oak Titmouse. Another primary focus will be on the wealth of spring flowers. Top this off with a theater performance at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival. A walk along Oak Creek for orioles, tanagers, and other spring migrants tops the trip.

Then, we visit Malheur National Wildlife Refuge on May 12-15. This is ASC's signature trip, witnessing the spring migration of waterfowl, shorebirds, and songbirds at one of America's greatest refuges.

Later trips include Summer Lake (June 7-9), the Willows (July 17-21), Steens Mountain (August 15-18), and the South Coast in mid-September.

All trips usually have a wide range of expert observers who point out more than birds, like butterflies, dragonflies, mammals, reptiles, and flowers.

Signup sheets for all trips will be available at ASC general meetings and by email to framsey5@comcast.net. Signup should be accompanied by a \$25 deposit for each trip - due one month before departure; payable to ASC and sent to PO Box 148 in Corvallis, 97339. You may also volunteer as a driver (slots available on the signup sheets), and drivers will not be charged for the regular trip costs. If the signups are not sufficient to run any trip, it will be canceled, and any deposits will be refunded.

Board Meeting Summary

April 11, 2024, 7 PM

Present: Phyllis Bailey, Ray Drapek, Karan Fairchild, Bill Gellatly, Jake Keen, Mai Kiigemagi, Dave Mellinger, Suzanne Ortiz, Dodie Wilson

The meeting was called to order by Dave. Minutes from the March Board meeting were approved.

President's message: Karan brought up and the board discussed the need for a secretary for ASC. Some suggestions to recruit one included, listing the position on an online Volunteer Job Board along with advertising on the My Impact website that Ray has used to secure volunteers for Hesthavn.

Also discussed was our continuing need for a listserve vs. mailing list, as means of managing membership list and communicating with the board and general membership. Bill mentioned that there are important pros and cons regarding having just one or both. Since we have until July 1 to decide on keeping or dropping listserve, we will take up the issue again before that time.

Upcoming board vote on ASC's name change was discussed. Board agreed to holding a secret ballot, with the options being "for," "against," and "abstain." Bill will create the ballots. A simple majority will decide the issue. The board will take up later whether we will include "doing business as" (DBA) as part of our official name. Dave will check our constitution to ensure we are within the limits of our authority to carry out this change and to make sure who is eligible to vote. Karan reiterated that every officer and board member should be at the meeting or assign a proxy to vote in their stead.

Karan said that Eric definitely wants help running the audio/visuals at general meetings. He wants to ensure that someone else can take over if he needs to be away.

Treasurer: Budget Requests are needed.

Program Committee: Mai reported that speakers are set for the rest of this year and are coming into place for next year. She also said that ASC has received checks from the Kidd family estate. Discussion ensued on ideas for allocating these generous funds. Ideas included:

- Funding bird surveys headed up by Doug Robinson;
- Upgrading parking, Ray's Trail, and ramp accessibility at Hesthavn;

- Funding creation of a video for ASC's website to show accessibility at Hesthavn;
- Funding long-term maintenance on the barn.

These will be discussed further and decided upon at a future time.

Education: Upcoming events participation include:

- Get Outdoors Day at Peavy Arboretum;
- Marys Peak bird information table in May and June;
- Adams Elementary School field day;
- OAC meeting via Zoom on education, to be attended by Jayshaun, May 2 and 3.

Conservation: Written report from Jayshaun Talbert, conservation chair:

Lights Out surveys to pick up next week as migration ramps up; Jayshaun needs a report from the education team to present at the OAC Zoom meeting in early May; OSU Bird Nerds club is seeking pledges in support of their fundraising birdathon taking place April 13-20. Promote at general meeting.

Bioblitz event at Ankeny NWR. Jayshaun is requesting a \$50.00 donation from ASC to help with snacks at the event.

Volunteers are needed to assist with American Kestrel surveys in Willamette Valley counties to ascertain beneficial placement of suitable nest boxes for the species.

After discussion, Suzanne moved and the motion was seconded, to give \$50.00 to support the Bioblitz program at Ankeny NWR. The motion carried unanimously.

The board discussed ASC signing on in support of the Great Basin Saline Lakes preservation effort. Bill moved to sign on, the motion was seconded, and the vote was a unanimous yes.

Renaming Committee: The Board is voting on May 9th at Hesthavn during the board meeting.

Field trips: Suzanne reported that the team met on March 28 and determined that more drivers are needed for the Summer Lake trip in early June. Overall, more participants are needed, as well as drivers, for most of the trips. One trip has been canceled due to lack of participants. To be reported on at May general meeting.

Sustainability: Suzanne reported on Natural Areas Celebration Week coming up soon. ASC will participate by opening Hesthavn each day during the week to provide visitors with environmental information and education.

Hesthavn: Ray showed the Board a sign he will be placing at Hesthavn designating it as important wildlife habitat. The tree removal at Hesthavn is going ahead as planned in the coming week. Mason bees are coming out of hibernation at Hesthavn. Ray has had volunteers coming to Hesthavn to help with weeding, general maintenance.

The May Board meeting will be held at Hesthavn.

Meeting adjourned.
