The Sea Otter: Returning a Keystone Species to Oregon's Kelp Forests, Presented by Chanel Hason

January 16, 2025, 7:30 PM

Sea otters once thrived along Oregon's coastline, playing a vital role in maintain ing healthy marine ecosystems. Tragically, the fur trade of the 18th and 19th



centuries led to their local extinction, leaving a critical void in our coastal waters. Without sea otters, Oregon's kelp forests have suffered, and now face additional pressures from warming oceans and unchecked populations of purple sea urchins that decimate these vital underwater habitats.



The Elakha Alliance, meaning "sea otter" in the Clatsop-Chinookan language, is dedicated to restoring this lost keystone species to Oregon. Our mission is to reintroduce sea otters to their historic range, bringing ecological balance back to the coastline, supporting vibrant marine life, and honoring indigenous peoples' cultural connections with these animals.

Through research, collaboration with tribal nations and coastal communities, and education, we're working to ensure a future where sea otters and kelp forests thrive together once again. Join us to learn about this historic effort and how you can help make it a reality.

Chanel brings a wealth of experience in marine biology, animal husbandry, environmental education, nonprofit management, and social media marketing. She earned her degree from CSU Monterey Bay, where she developed a passion for otters through her volunteer work with sea and river otters at the Monterey Bay Aquarium. Chanel has conducted marine science research on the Great Barrier Reef in Australia and worked with Jean-Michel Cousteau's Ambassadors of the

Environment program at the Ritz-Carlton Reserve in Puerto Rico.

In 2016 Chanel moved to Oregon to complete her MS in Sustainability Education from Portland State University. Since then, she has remained deeply involved in marine conservation, including volunteering with the Surfrider Foundation in Portland. Chanel is dedicated to fostering connections between people and the environment through education, outreach, and conservation initiatives.

Conservation News

News From the Nature Center

Handicap-accessible trail – The year before last we had great hopes of obtaining some grant money to convert Ray's Trail into a handicap-accessible trail. At the time we were looking into creating a concrete trail, since

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we had volunteers who were able to work with concrete. But the grant didn't come to pass, the volunteers withdrew, and the project was tabled for the time being. Lately, we have had someone offer to donate money for the project and we are looking into working on it once more. This time we're thinking possibly of either concrete or blacktop. This time work will be completed by contractors. We will explore who could work on it, how they will do it, and how much it will cost. We envision a trail that completes the Ray's Trail circuit, plus a leg that goes over the bridge to a turnaround location on the other side of the bridge where people can

stop and look at the creek. We could use: 1) additional support money, and 2) volunteers willing to form a committee to explore the whos, whens and hows of this project.

Tiny visitors – For many months now we have had a troop of VERY young visitors who regularly come to Hesthavn. They are from the baby stage to toddlers to pre-kindergarten. Oh yes ... and their parents come too. They come, sit in a circle on the ground in the picnic area, sing songs, and explore the property. They are a tough bunch of little kids. We've seen them bundled up and sitting in the grass on days when there was frost on the ground. It's nice to see the next generation of conservationists get an early start.

Restoration work- Due to so many distractions from other projects and problems, the blackberries got several years free-rein at Hesthavn. They took full advantage of it and some large blackberry thickets formed. Lately, we have been slowly but surely taking out those thickets the old-fashioned way ... With a shovel. The easiest way to get a measure of how much effort has gone into this is to come take a look at the very large blackberry slash pile in the middle of the property. Anyone interested in joining in on the blackberry fun can contact us. A splendid time is guaranteed for all.

Corvallis 2024 Sustainability Report

The 2024 Corvallis Sustainability Report has been released and is available online. Learn how new state requirements will promote Climate-Friendly and Equitable Communities. For instance, new parking lot construction in excess of half an acre will require tree canopies that cover at least 40% of the new parking area.

The annual report also provides an update on a collaborative project at Starker Park that addressed a 2023 winter flood caused by a beaver dam. In the summer of 2023, a pond leveler was installed that created a permanent leak through the beaver dam. The presence of the leveler doesn't eliminate flooding but does reduce the frequency of flooding and will make faster drainage possible. <u>Click here to access the report</u>

2025 Multi-Day Field Trips

Once again, let's get to know Oregon's wealth of birdwatching locations. Start with a trip to the Klamath Basin wildlife refuges, March 14-16. White-fronted, Snow and Ross's Geese head a splendid array of migratory waterfowl, and we may catch the first few migrating passerines.

The Rogue Valley is April 25-27. Our objective is to find birds of the California chaparral -Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, California Towhee, and Oak Titmouse. Another primary focus will be on the wealth of spring flowers. Top this off with a theater performance at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival: Oscar Wilde's comedy *The Importance of Being Earnest*. A walk along Oak Creek for orioles, tanagers, warblers and other spring migrants rounds out the trip.

Then, Malheur National Wildlife Refuge (May 17-20). This is our signature trip, witnessing the spring migration of waterfowl, shorebirds, and songbirds at one of America's greatest refuges.

The Summer Lake trip of June 13-15 features the search for Snowy Plover, Common Poorwill and Yellow Rail.

Next, the Wallowas trip explores the NE corner of the state (July 17-21) and spectacular scenery.

Steens Mountain (August 14-17) takes us up to Oregon's highest road, where Graycrowned and Black Rosy Finches forage on snowbanks.

The final trip is to the South Coast in mid-September.

All trips usually have a wide range of expert observers who point out not only the birds, but butterflies, dragonflies, mammals, reptiles, flowers and geology.

Signup sheets for all trips will be available at ASC general meetings, and by email to <u>flramsey5@comcast.net</u>. Signing up should be accompanied by a \$25 deposit for each trip - due one month before departure; payable to MVBA and sent to PO Box 148 in Corvallis, 97339. You may also volunteer as a driver (slots available on the signup sheets). Drivers will not be charged for the regular transportation costs. If the signups are not sufficient to run any trip, it will be cancelled and any deposits will be refunded.
