Northern Saw-Whet Owls: Population Shifts During Migration? Presented by JayShaun Talbert May 15, 2025

Northern Saw-whet Owls (NSWOs) are elusive, nocturnal raptors that serve as important indicators of ecosystem health, yet much remains unknown about their migration patterns and population dynamics, especially in Oregon. This presentation shares findings from a pilot study focused on Oregon NSWOs

during the fall migration season, conducted as part of an undergraduate thesis. The research combines traditional capture methods, such as mist netting with an emerging technology: Playback Recording Devices (PRDs). This is the first known application of PRDs for studying owl species, offering a novel approach to monitoring vocal activity while minimizing disturbance.

The study aims to collect vital biological data (age, sex, body condition) from captured individuals and to evaluate the efficiency of direct capture methods in comparison to PRD-based acoustic monitoring. By exploring population shifts across the forests within the Willamette Valley, this research contributes to a better understanding of how NSWO distribution reflects habitat quality and broader ecological changes, including those driven by climate change. The findings will inform land management strategies and improve long-term monitoring protocols for nocturnal migratory birds.

Jayshaun Talbert is an undergraduate student in Fisheries, Wildlife, and Conservation Sciences at Oregon State University, specializing in avian migratio and conservation. He also serves as Conservation Chair for the Mid-Willamette Bird Alliance. His current research centers on the migration behavior and population dynamics of Northern Saw-whet Owls (NSWOs) in Oregon. His primary interests within the wildlife field encompass avian population dynamics, movement ecology, and reproductive ecology. He's had the privilege of being a part of several avian projects including seabirds, raptors, songbirds, sage-grouse and more. Outside of his research and coursework, he's involved with different wildlife organizations on campus and serves as the Student Liaison for the Oregon Chapter of the Wildlife Society. When he's not doing anything wildliferelated, you can find him out adventuring with his friends, reading, watching movies, or recording episodes for his media analysis podcast.

Hesthavn News

Gutter covers – After years of risking my neck to climb up a tall ladder to clean the gutters at Hesthavn I finally got smart and asked the MWBA board if I could get some gutter covers installed. They, of course, said yes. The gutters on the creek side of the barn are high up and I had to climb a tall ladder to get to them. Then there was the water tank on the Southwest side of the barn that I had to lean out over to get to the gutters. The gutter covers are now installed, and hopefully I won't be risking my neck ... at least for that ... after this.

Conversations School Visitors – On May 22 the Crossroads Conversation School paid a visit to Hesthavn. They offer basic English conversation to women who are temporarily in Corvallis while either they or their partners participate in OSU graduate or visiting scholar programs. I took them on a quick tour of the barn, and they hiked the trails.

Pump Issues – Hesthavn uses a rainwater collection system to collect water for our native plantings on the property. Rainwater collected on the roof of the barn i stored in a tank next to the barn, and then the water is pumped up to a water tan at the top of the hill. From there, water can be gravity-fed to about 7 spigots scattered in different places on the property. We've been having problems with the pump lately. The pump wiring must be on the fritz, because it keeps blowing 30-amp fuses. This is probably the result of critters and corrosion in the ground-level pump box. Jim Fairchild and Ken Vandehey will be checking the pump box out to see if they can fix the problem. If they succeed, we will be able to manually turn on the pump to get water up into the upper tank. But there is a second part t the problem, and if we can fix that, then we won't need to manually turn on the pump. For this second part, the pump box might need to be rebuilt/redesigned. / shut-off switch that indicates a full upper tank is no longer functioning. Jim Fairchild thinks that fixing this will probably be a job for a plumber.

Mason bees – If you visit Hesthavn. Check out the mason bee box that is on the south wall of the barn. This is the box with a bunch of holes poked into a block of wood. Mason bees are solitary, and so they don't form hives like the honey bee. The solitary female lays eggs in these holes. They lay an egg, then they leave a dab of pollen for the larva bee to feed on, and then they put in a clay plug. They repeat the process until they fill the hole with eggs, pollen, and plugs. Right now, the bees are busilv laving eggs.

the bee box. In early June, I will have to remove the block with holes. If it stays out past June, then parasitic wasps become a problem.

Malheur Field Trip 2025

Our annual field trip (53rd?) to Malheur National Wildlife Refuge will be May 17th through 20th. The Malheur National Wildlife Refuge was created in 1908 to protect a "breeding ground for native birds." The refuge and the surrounding areas are some of the most important stopover spots for migratory birds on the western flyway. The timing of this trip should coincide with the arrival of many songbirds, including warblers and numerous other species. We should also see many waterfowl and shorebirds, though it will be at the latter part of that migration, so the large flocks may have moved on.

As we travel east on Saturday, we will make several stops looking for birds we may not see elsewhere on our trip (Green-tailed Towhee, Calliope Hummingbird) We will arrive at the Malheur Field Station, our home base for the next three

nights, in time for dinner. We will be sleeping in one of the dorms. Evening and early morning walks nearby are fun. A pre-breakfast visit to Refuge Headquarters is also a nice way to start the day.

The itinerary for the next two days will depend on water levels and where bird are being seen. With the melting of a large snow pack, there is much more water in the area than in recent years. Suitable habitat is spread out, so waterfowl and waders will likely be spread out more than in dry years.

We will spend one day, likely Sunday, exploring the northern part of the refuge. We will look for Burrowing Owls, Ferruginous Hawks, Golden Eagles, and an assortment of passerines, shore birds, and waterfowl. The second day we will head south to P Ranch, Page Springs, Frenchglen, and the Diamond area to loo for Bobolinks, Yellow-breasted Chats, Orioles, flycatchers, and more. On Monday we will have a family-style dinner at the Diamond Hotel - always a treat.

On the last day, we will check out the area near Burns for remaining Snow Geese, Long-billed Curlews, and more Sandhill Cranes. Lunch will be at Sage Hen Hill and will include a short hike that will bring us Mountain Bluebirds, Brewer's Sparrows, and possibly a Blue-gray Gnatcatcher. We should be home between 7 and 8 PM.

The trip is full at this time, but there is a waiting list. If you want to be added to this list please email Fred at flramsey5@comcast.net.
